Family fights being left out of a will

e are receiving an increasing number of enquiries about challenging wills.

Part of the reason for this is that nowadays, there are many blended families and many parents who have entered into second or third relationships with "significant others". These relationships can create difficulties when someone dies, particularly if a person dies with a will that is not up-to-date, or with no will at all.

When you make a will, you want to know that your property will go to the people you want it to. You can leave close family members out of your will, or recognise family members in unequal shares if there are good reasons for it, but the will may be challenged if those left out or inadequately provided for believe they should have received more.

However, it is not only in these types of blended family situations that a will can be challenged. In one case, a deceased father left his estate entirely to his surviving wife, the mother of his children.

Although the facts of this case are unusual, it does highlight the need for each of us to have not only an up-to-date will, but one that is well considered and based on good quality advice.
